And for very necessary contact with less happy modern realities, there is guided involvement in community and civic aid projects ranging from the Peace Corps to tutoring the underprivileged.

But maybe worrying about "little" things like that is what helps an extraordinary 64% of our girls go on to graduate and professional school (a figure far higher than the national average for most women's colleges).

And your daughter may be just the girl who can help us raise that 64% average even higher.
